WORDS FROM THE PASTOR

I remember memorizing the Ten Commandments, the 23rd Psalm, and the names of all 66 books of the Bible when I was a boy attending Sunday School. That information has served me well over the years. I am more likely to stumble through these items now than I did then. However, if we study the Bible only for these kinds of lists of information, or for historical records, I think we miss the point. I tell my classes regularly what one of my professors told us - the Bible is **not** just for **Information** but also for **Transformation**.

For Christians, the Bible becomes sacramental, in the sense that it is through reading, reflecting, studying and mediating on the scriptures that we encounter the God we know in Jesus Christ. As we listen for the word of God to us, the message of God's love and grace and salvation becomes part of our lives and we are transformed. As Paul writes in Philippians 2:5 "In your relationships with one another have the same attitude of mind Christ Jesus had." Or again in Romans 8: 29 we are "to be conformed to the image of his Son..."

Part of our calling as a community of faith is to communicate the Good News we discover in the Bible and in our lives. In 2011 our focus as a congregation was to read the Bible through in a year. Many of you read the entire Bible. Most of you read at least some, including the hard to understand, challenging parts. In the Bible's flow from creation in Genesis to the Consummation in Revelation, we find ourselves in the period of the Church. The Church's task, our task, much like the task of the Bible itself, is to communicate or share the message of God's love to others by our words and our deeds. Therefore, let me add an additional phase. I would suggest we are to move from information to transformation to communication.

At our Annual General Meeting I used the following analogy of the Bible to point to our individual and collective calling to communicate the Good News to others. The Bible contains 66

books written by a wide range of people—some of the authors are well known like Paul and David, but many other contributors we will never know by name. Each book of the Bible in some ways stands alone, but is also part of a whole. Each book has a story to tell, but each book is also part of a bigger story. The Bible would be weaker if any single book was left out. So it is with SCC. We each have stories to tell. We each have faith perspectives to communicate. We, like the Bible, are made of people from many places and backgrounds, which make the church richer. The sum is greater than the parts. We lose much if any one withdraws, either literally or figuratively. Each of us has a story to tell of God's working in our life. We each do this in our own way and place.

Just as some books are letters and others are Gospels, and others are strange to us like the Apocalypse (Revelation), each one of us has a unique message to share—whether it is the message of **the struggle of our faith like Job**; or the message of how beautiful and wonderful is God's world like the Psalmist declares; or the message of how we have experienced the spread of the love of God like we find in the book of Acts—each of us has a story to tell. We as a church are the poorer if we fail to tell our story.

Indeed, the world is poorer if we fail to tell the story of God in our lives. This is part of our challenge as a church. As SCC we have the double story to share—where we have seen the risen Christ in our lives **generally** and how this congregation in particular has been a community where we can share and grow in our faith. Some will begin the process of communicating the Good News with a simple invitation to come to a church service. Others will share more personally their faith perspectives. Still others will embody the message as they reach out to care for those in need. We as a community communicate the love of God by providing a place where all are welcome, where questions are valued, where the Good News is preached, lived and shared.

Though we have finished our Grand Sweep series reading through the whole Bible, we will continue to study from its pages. More importantly, we will seek to move from the words on the pages as **information**, to the encounter with the Living Word so that we will continue to be **transformed** and better able to **communicate** the love of God in Christ.

In March a small group from the church went to the hogar with Fundacion Crescendo to do some painting. The seven residents (adults with intellectual disabilities) were present and seemed to enjoy having their bedrooms painted!!

At our Annual General Meeting in April, we learned about several community programs that our church supports by providing meeting space at no charge or a minimal charge:

- Alanon a support group for friends and family of alcoholics
- Casinuevo a women's group that makes knitted toys and blankets for the hospital ward at Hospital Calvo Mackenna
- British Commonwealth Society an organization that offers support to needy individuals from the British community
- CHIMPS (Chilean Musical Playgroup in Santiago) – a parent/child group that offers a fun morning out and support for parents
- Operation Mobilization a religious group that supports local churches and send out missionaries around the world
- Iglesia Anglicana de Providencia –
 This church has been renting space
 from SCC for about 30 years and
 shares our building for their worship,
 education and fellowship activities.

There are occasionally other non-profit groups that use our facilities, such as Habitat for Humanity and Fundacion Crescendo, a center and home for adults with intellectual disabilities
